

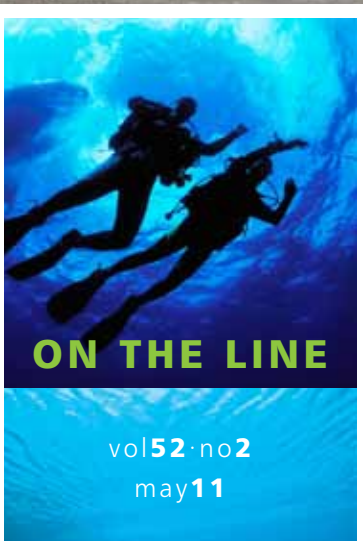
# Winter Dive Club

Castle Hill in Newport is one of the most popular night dives on the schedule. Maybe that's why we dive it so many times during the season. It is my favorite dive so here's a preview for any of you who have never done it before and are thinking about diving it this year.

First, this is an advanced dive. Mainly, because of the current, location and the fact that it's a night dive. You can also go as deep as you want but you don't have to in order to enjoy the dive. If you have never done this dive before, you need to buddy up with someone who has no matter what your certification level.

The dive starts with the assembly of boats and divers at Fort Wetherill in Jamestown. This happens around 7pm. There's the usual OCA greeting and discussion about the dive while we're waiting for stragglers to show up. This is a good time to go through your gear while there's still some sunlight. You'll want to bring a good dive light and a backup light. A bag for lobsters is also a must have, but don't forget your lobster license. RI DEM frequent the parking lot and often check for licenses and short lobsters. Another thing that is done when you night dive on live-a-boards that we should do is to bring a light stick or strobe for the top of your tank. It's a good safety measure that we somehow never remember to do. I can think of more than one instance where we've had to fish someone out that got caught in the current and it's much easier to see the diver when they have a light on their tank.

Next, make sure you help the captain launch the boat. The ramp can be tricky to navigate depending on the size of boat and condition of the ramp. We mostly dive inflatables here but we also see some of the larger dive boats show up on many occasions.

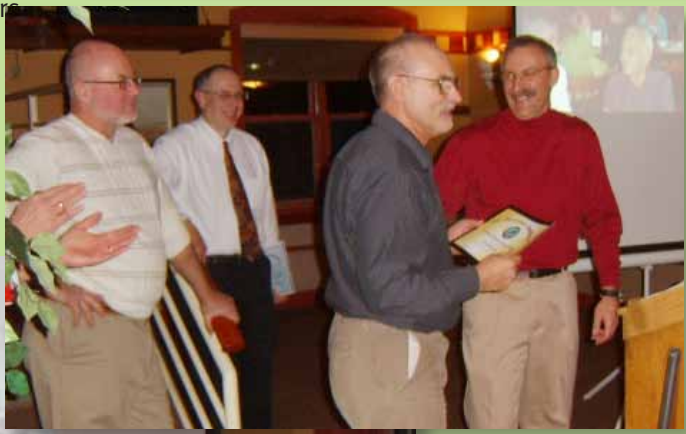
Also, a Lifetime Membership Award was given to **Ed Packhem** for his years of dedicated club involvement.

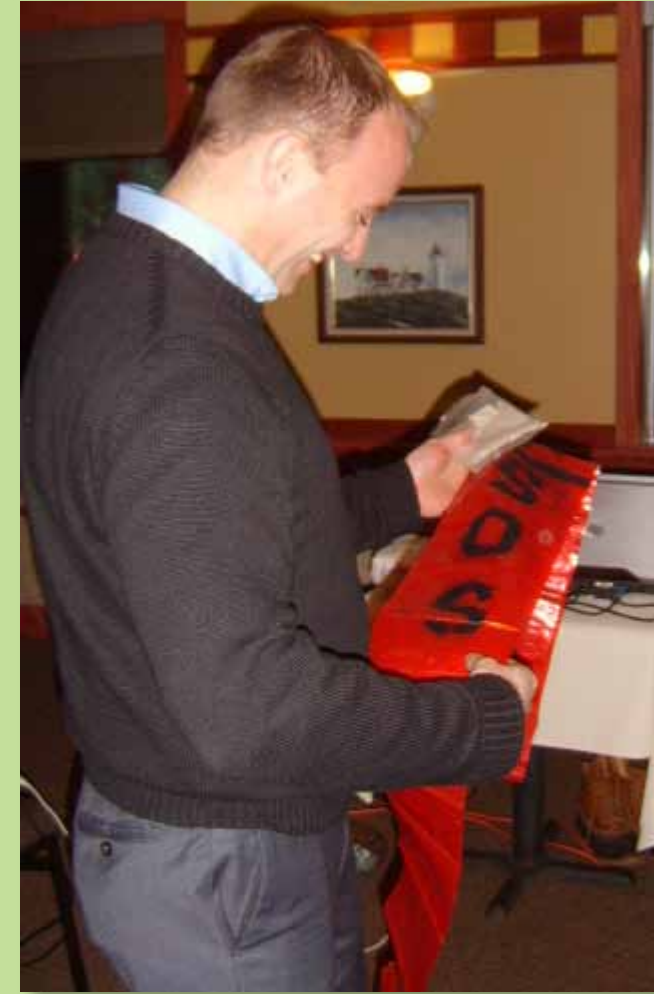
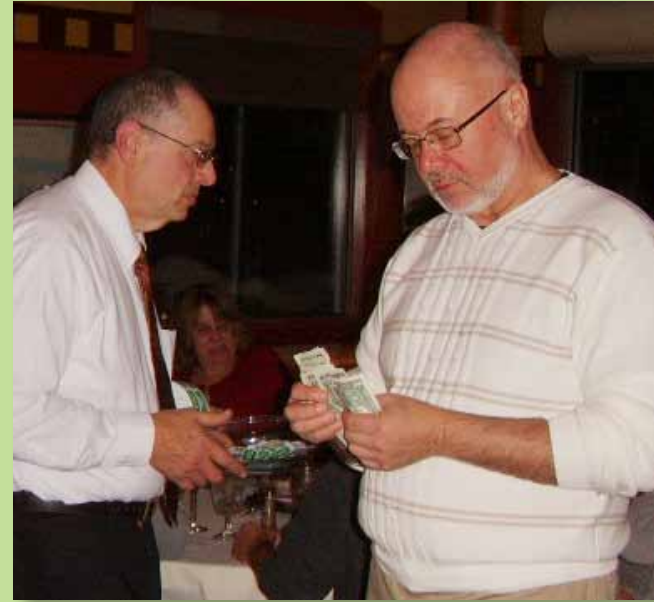

The ride over to Castle Hill is a short one. We cross the East Passage in about five minutes and can anchor in one of two places. For this article, we'll anchor in the north cove between the light house and the cove that leads to the Coast Guard station. You'll be in water that ranges from 15 to 25 feet deep. The other place is a spot just south of the light house where there is a sandy bottom. I prefer the north cove because it's out of any current and sheltered from boat traffic.

Ideally, from the north cove, the dive should start at slack tide and current and finish with the current starting to come in. This way, if you get caught up in the current, your at least heading in the right direction at the end of the dive because you'll be heading south at the beginning of the dive. Wait until it gets dark – the lobsters will venture further from their holes to feed in the dark and will be easier to catch. Also, the darker it is, the more effective your dive light will be to reveal the true colors of the structure you'll be diving on.

Take a compass heading before you get in the water. If you do things right, you won't have to pop up to find your way back to the boat. Flip over when the time is right and go right to the bottom. Depending on where you've anchored, the bottom will be either sandy, sandy with some seaweed or sandy with some rocky formations. If you've read your compass right, you need to head east and as you go you'll notice that the depth will increase. Chances are the water clarity will increase as well and by the time you reach 40 feet, you'll most likely see the edge of Castle Hill where the cliff drops off to as deep as you want to go.

At this point you want to start heading south so that the wall is on your left and the deep on your right. You may notice a current but if we've planned the dive right it shouldn't be strong. When you start looking for lobsters, you'll see the true colors of Castle Hill and plenty of sea life. Skates, fluke, eels, sculpin, rays, tautog, stripers, squid, sponges, silversides, anemones, crab, shrimp and more. This is why, if I don't get any lobsters, I still love this dive. Search the depth to

find the lobster. It doesn't always happen this way but when you find the first keeper, keep moving along at that depth and you may just find more.

If not, vary your depth but keep a sharp eye on your pressure gauge and computer because the beauty of this place can make you loose track of time. Enjoy all there is to see and when you get down to half your air supply, just turn around so that the wall is on your

right as you return to the boat. Decrease your depth gradually as you return. Again, if we've timed the dive right, there should be a current heading in that you can ride back to the north cove. You'll most likely recognize the edge of the cliff that forms the edge of the cove at around 40 feet. If you've tried to enter the cove before the edge, you've most likely wound up on the surface because there's no place else to go. On a flat night, that's not a problem but if there's a little chop, the rocks that form the edge between land and water become a hazard. If your depth is less than 20 feet and you haven't hit any flat spots yet, don't keep going up. Stay at depth and continue to follow the wall on your right until you reach the edge. This will keep you off the rocks.

Once you reach the edge of the cliff and go over it into shallow water, you'll notice the current decrease. You're in the lee of Castle Hill and the bottom will be sandy, sandy with seaweed or sandy with rocks – just like you started. This is the only dive I know where there is plenty to do on your safety stop. First, if you've gradually come up along your return trip, that counts for a significant part of your safety stop. Second, while you're in that 15 to 25 foot deep water, you can still look around for lobsters. I can't tell you how many times I've found keepers here. If you're in that depth, in that bottom and there's no current, chances are you're not far from the boat. Rise slowly and you'll probably see the lights from Shamrock Cliff or if you're real good, the lights from the boat near by.

By now, the band has started to play at Shamrock Cliff and you'll have live music for the short swim to the boat. Every now and then, there will even be some fire works going off to celebrate the full bag of lobsters that you've surfaced with.

What I've just described is the perfect dive at Castle Hill. If the conditions are right, this is really the way it is. Just keep in mind that this is an advanced dive and you should make the appropriate decisions according to the conditions. For instance, sometimes the conditions aren't perfect or we've made an error in interpreting the tide and/or current information. It happens. Dive the conditions that you encounter not the conditions that you think should be in place. There have been many instances where I've jumped in, made it to depth only to discover that the current is a bit stronger than anticipated or that it's going in the wrong direction. Use your head and your dive training. You may still be able to enjoy this dive, just dive the conditions.

This is a great night dive and as I said, it's my favorite dive, period. It's also a great spear fishing location and we've used it as a back up location when conditions have blown us out of our first choice. It usually produces targets for our spear guns. Just be careful during the day because the boat traffic is pretty heavy.

This dive is on the schedule and more than once. I don't usually miss this dive so I'll probably see you there. We usually have a little cook out afterwards in the parking lot at Fort Wetherill. Hot dogs, sauerkraut, and don't forget to chop those onions just right!

# The Weedons dive St. John

**SAINT JOHN, USVI** • 5:30 o’early in the morning of Sunday, December 26th, the snow had begun to fall. Bill, Chris, their families and a couple friends boarded a shuttle with their 20 bags of luggage, scuba & snorkel gear for St. John, USVI for our 2010 winter vacation. That Sunday as we boarded for the 9:45am flight, I watched in horror as the 757 was de-iced multiple times, with multiple cleaning agents. Fifteen minutes late, we departed Boston Logan on one of the last flights to leave with the imminent blizzard of 2010 taking aim on the Northeast. The ten of us rented a 5-bedroom villa in Chocolate Hole, located on the eastern shoreline of Great Cruz Bay, near the St. John Westin Resort.

Prior to departing, Bill and I arranged and packaged a 3-day, 6-tank dive with our favorite dive outfit - Low Key Watersports - a professional PADI Dive Center located a few steps from the main ferry dock in Cruz Bay, St. John. Tuesday, December 28th, Bill, I and other vacationers dove Tektite and Leaf. Tektite and Leaf are located on the western side of St. John, promise great diving and locals confirm, “the best snorkeling” can be found here. If you’re willing to make the pilgrimage without a boat, awesome snorkeling can be found by foot. Half the fun is getting there.

Fun Fact: “In a joint effort by NASA, the Department of the Interior and the Navy, Tektite was anchored in 50’ on the seafloor in Greater Lameshur Bay. In 1969, four “aquanuts” spent two months being monitored by behavioral specialists for the psychological effects of extended isolation and the physiological results of breathing compressed air. Divers visiting the site will find a varied terrain of coral-encrusted tunnels, caves and ledges. Tarpon, squid, triggerfish, mackerel and small reef fish thrive here.”

Wednesday, December 29, we dove Little St. James and Johns Folly which are located between St. Thomas and St. John, visibility for all dives was not ‘the best’ I’ve seen in the Caribbean, but far better than any local bay dive in 2010 bar none. Average depth was 60FSW for 50min. in 73° water with 30’ viz. taking in the sights of reefs, caves and crevices, and limited aqua life; however I did my deepest dive to date, and saw my first small octopus.
